

# 'I hope there's more support for them'

After the successful theatrical run of her film Sunshine, Maris Racal said she was proud of the feedback they received about her film with director Antonette Jadaone.

"The main goal of the film was to spread awareness, to get more people to be passionate about the message of the film. So I think we did it. We did that part. We took active, baby steps and nagawa natin paunti unti. And we're going to get there," she said.



# Glimpses On Significant Developments In The Philippines

### Disciplining A Child: Abuse Case.

According to the Philippine Supreme Court(SC), "Disciplining children will be considered child abuse if there is a clear intent to harm the child's dignity." As reported by a national newspaper, citing a decision written by SC Associate Justice Jhosep Lopez, said that "The Supreme Court reiterated that disciplining children, even if it results in physical injuries, does not automatically amount to child abuse. For such to be considered abuse, there must be a clear intent to harm a child's dignity." The High Court added that the parents' discipline measures for their children "should not be violent, excessive, or disproportionate to their misbehaviour." It also stressed that if there is no intent to harm the child's dignity, the offender will not be liable for child abuse but can be charged with other crimes under the Revised Penal Code instead. In this recent case ruling, the SC affirmed a lower court's decision finding a father guilty of violent and excessive discipline for his 12-year-old daughter and 10-year-old son. The SC found that the father beat his children from 2017-2018, kicking his daughter, striking her with a wooden rod with a nail, pulling her hair, hitting his children with a dustpan, and cursing at them. The SC noted that "The father appealed to the SC, arguing that he had no intention of harming his children's dignity." However, the SC ruled that "his actions went beyond reasonable discipline, showing a clear intent to harm the children's dignity." Previously, the Regional Trial Court (RTC) and the Court of Appeals (CA) found the father guilty of violating Republic Act No. 7610



### Filipino Literacy Rate.

Basic literacy refers to "the ability to and Mass Media Survey (FLEMMS) released by the Philippine Statistics ther that about 60.17 million out of 85 million Filipinos aged 10 to 64 can read, write, compute and comprehend written information, meaning that they have high literacy skills.

Although the literacy rates may seem encouraging, the study also showed that 6.9 % of Filipinos aged five and older remain illiterate, people who cannot read, write or perform basic arithmetic. The PSA noted that "A significant gap between basic and functional literacy, with the gap widest in the 60 to 64 age group. "Ang mataas na rate ng literacy ay hindi maaaring kalimutan o pabayaan ng mga stakeholders para maging kampante. Ang edukasyon sa Pilipinas ay nasa krisis at nangangailangan ng lubos na atensyon at tulong ng mga kina-uukulan, lalo na ang gobierno at ng lipunan, ng mga guro, at mga namumuno sa edukasyon at mga paaralan.."

### A Bigamy Case.

In the Philippine legal system, bigamy is governed primarily by the Revised Penal Code (RPC) of 1930. Bigamy is explicitly defined and penalized under Article 349 of the Revised Penal Code (Act No. 3815, as amended). The code defines two types of bigamy. The first is simply that "you remarry even though your first marriage has not been dissolved." The second is "those who contract to marry without having a definitive judgment that the former spouse is truly dead." Over the years, jurisprudence from the Philippine Supreme Court and lower courts "has refined the application of bigamy laws, addressing nuances such as good faith, foreign divorces, and the interplay with civil family laws." In a recent case, the High Court upheld the conviction of one Erwin Bonbon, who was found guilty of bigamy after marrying Elizabeth Bonbon in 1999 while still legally married to another woman. Court records show Bonbon first married Gemma Cunada in 1988. He entered into another marriage in 1994, followed by his marriage to Elizabeth in 1999, all without legally ending his preceding marriages. The Supreme Court (SC) has ruled that the 15-year time limit for filing bigamy cases begins not when the bigamous marriage is registered with the government, but when it is discovered. Functional literacy skills, on the other hand, refer to "higher-level skills in addition to reading, writing, and computing, such as drawing inferences from text and integrating information." According to the 2024 Functional Literacy, Education Authority on July 2, 2025, it said that 90 per cent of Filipinos aged five and older, around 93.09 million out of the latest population count of 103.46 million have basic literacy skills. This means that seven in 10 Filipinos aged 10 to 64 are functionally literate, while a high nine in 10 can read, write and perform basic mathematics. The FLEMMS indicated fur-

## Trump's Tariffs are Illegal

The U.S. Court of Appeals for the Federal Circuit in Washington, D.C., in a split decision, agreed with a specialized federal trade court that Trump exceeded his authority as president by hitting Canada, Mexico, China and dozens of other trading partners with sweeping tariffs that have upended global trade and economies.

The ruling did not strike down the tariffs immediately, however, but instead keeps them in place until Oct. 14 to allow for the Trump administration to appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court.

"ALL TARIFF ARE STILL IN EFFECT," Trump posted on his Truth Social website after the ruling was released.

"Today a Highly Partisan Appeals Court incorrectly said that our tariffs should be removed, but they know the United States of America will win in the end."

The 7-4 decision upholds a ruling in May by the U.S. Court of International Trade, which found Trump's use of the International



Emergency Economic Powers Act (IEEPA) to impose tariffs by declaring national

emergencies was unlawful and violated the U.S. Constitution, which affords tariffing and tax powers to the U.S. Congress.

That court's order to immediately rescind Trump's tariffs was quickly stayed by the appeals court to allow the case to proceed.

Trump used IEEPA for two of his largest trading policies: so-called "reciprocal tariffs" on dozens of countries to combat what Trump claimed was a national emergency of trade deficits; and what the courts have referred to as "trafficking tariffs" on Canada, Mexico and China, which Trump has accused of contributing to a national emergency of fentanyl entering the U.S.

The majority of justices on the appeals court sided with the trade court in noting the IEEPA makes

no mention of tariffs, and that the Trump administration was wrong to argue the president has unlimited tariffing power under that law.

"We are not addressing whether the President's actions should have been taken as a matter of policy. Nor are we deciding whether IEEPA authorizes any tariffs at all," the majority

"Rather, the only issue we resolve on appeal is whether the Trafficking Tariffs and Reciprocal Tariffs imposed by the Challenged Executive Orders are authorized by IEEPA. We conclude they are not."

The court noted Trump has other powers to impose tariffs without Congress, including Section 232 of the U.S. Trade

House spokesperson Kush Desai said in a statement to Global News that the administration "look(s) forward to ultimate victory in this matter."

"President Trump lawfully exercised the tariff powers granted to him by Congress to defend our national and economic security from foreign threats," Desai said.

The case was originally brought by several U.S. state attorneys general and a group of private American businesses that have argued the tariffs add

extra costs and uncertainty to international trade, as well as small businesses and consumers who rely on cheaper foreign goods. The lawsuits did not address the Section 232 tariffs.

"The President cannot lawfully impose tariffs on his own, and IEEPA does not give him unlimited unilateral tariff authority," Jeffrey Schwab of the Liberty Justice Center, which brought the lawsuit on behalf of the private business plaintiffs, said in a statement after the ruling.

"This decision protects American businesses and consumers from the uncertainty and harm caused by these unlawful tariffs."

# Philippines seeking US tariff exemptions for selected exports

THE PHILIPPINES is asking the US to exempt exports of agricultural products and other goods from the 19% tariff imposed by US President Donald J. Trump, a Trade official said.

Trade Undersecretary Allan B. Gepty said the government is seeking US tariff exemptions for exports of agricultural commodities, electronics, vehicle tires, bags and aircraft parts.

"We submitted a list of products we asked the US to exempt from the imposed tariff rates, because these are key and complementary items. And some of them, in fact, are not even produced or manufactured there (in the US)," he told senators at a Senate briefing on the tariff set by Washington on Philippine exports.

"The immediate need right now is we want to negotiate for an exemption, because we want to protect our industries whose main export market is the US," he added.

The US began imposing a 19% tariff on Philippine goods starting Aug. 7.

"We already submitted to the US the products that should be exempted from the reciprocal tariffs," he said.

Mr. Gepty said about 23% of the country's total exports to the US are exempted from the 19% tariff.

In June, the United States was the top destination for Philippine-made goods amounting to \$1.22 billion, 35.2% higher from the same month a year

ago.



Around 53% of the Philippines' total exports to the US were semiconductors and

electronics, Mr. Gepty said.

The US has yet to set new global tariffs for semiconductors and pharmaceuticals. Mr. Trump had earlier said he plans to announce higher tariffs on imports of semiconductors, but companies that plan to build manufacturing facilities in the US would be exempted.

"Ninety-nine percent of our semiconductors as of now are still exempted, there's still no problem" he said. "If the 100% continues, that's a big problem," he added.

Mr. Gepty said most of the semiconductors are made by US companies in the Philippines

'The story is based on real life, where issues of pride exist, warring families, cases of infidelity and emotional conflicts within the family,"



"I want to dedicate this trophy to my mom, my oldest sister, and my fitness trainer. You guys have been fighting all year round and still are fighting. Thank you so much for never giving up on me. Don't give up on yourselves. This trophy is for you guys. Hopefully we can celebrate all together very very soon," Fernandez said.

This triumph not only marks a career milestone but also highlights the strong bond between Fernandez and her mother, who has played a pivotal role in her tennis journey.

There's something about Leylah Fernandez that just hits different. Maybe it's her grit. Maybe it's the fact that she still smiles after three-hour matches. Or maybe it's that she's been doubted her whole life and keeps proving everyone wrong, quietly, steadily, and now? Loudly.

Over the weekend, the 22-year-old Filipina-Ecuadorian Canadian won the biggest title of her career: the D.C. Open.

She beat Anna Kalinskaya in the final like it was light work—6-1, 6-2. But it's what led up to that moment that makes this win so special.

Leylah didn't just win a tennis tournament. She reminded the world who she is.

# Meanwhile, Filipino sensation Alex Eala ends her run

Meanwhile, 20-year-old Filipino Alexandra Eala's US Open journey ended in the second round but her impact stretched far beyond the lines of Arthur Ashe Stadium. The 20-year-old

Filipina fell 4-6, 3-6 to Spain's Cristina Bucsa, yet her presence on one of tennis's grandest stages was a victory of another kind — one that carried the pride of an entire nation.

This summer has been the most defining stretch of her career. A journey that began with a strong run in Miami earlier this year blossomed into her first WTA Tour final in Birmingham, appearances at both Roland Garros and Wimbledon, and now her breakthrough in New York.

Eala's first-round triumph over 14th seed Clara Tauson made her the first Filipino player in the Open era to win a Grand Slam singles match, a breakthrough that reverberated across the Philippines and its global diaspora.

Against Bucsa, she fought with heart and fire, briefly going ahead 2-1 in the opening set before the Spaniard's steadiness turned the tide. Bucsa, ranked 95th, later admitted she had prepared for a tough battle because Eala had already beaten some of the world's best players this year, a testament to how quickly the Filipina has risen in stature.

### A recognition from rival

While the loss was clear, the at-

mosphere inside the stadium told a different story. The Filipino crowd, flags waving and voices rising in unison, roared for every point their rising star contested. Even after defeat, the applause lingered — a recognition that Eala is more than just a promising tennis player. She is a national icon in the making.

"I love that the Philippines loves her so much, and that's something beautiful and amazing for a sportsman — having a whole country encouraging you," Bucsa said, acknowledging both her opponent's fight and the energy in the stands.

For Eala, the US Open was both a test and a confirmation. Despite carrying an injury that forced her to withdraw from Cincinnati, she showed she belongs on this stage. Her Birmingham final, where she stretched Australia's Maya Joint to three sets, her upset wins against higher-ranked opponents earlier in the year, and now her US Open breakthrough all point to a player steadily carving her place among the sport's elite.

Beyond the results, she has become a symbol. The first Filipino woman to break into the WTA Top 100, she climbed to a career-high ranking of No 56 in June after starting the year at No 140, embodying the pride and possibility of a country rarely represented at tennis's top levels. Her training roots at the Rafa Nadal Academy link her with the game's greats, while her presence on magazine covers shows her growing cultural reach.

### Hungry for more

"I'm so proud of myself and what I've accomplished... it's made me feel hungry to do even more and to work even harder," she told Vogue Philippines. That hunger, combined with the energy of millions behind her, makes her journey only more compelling.

For now, the scoreboard in New York shows a second-round exit. But for the Philippines, Alex Eala's run stands as a beginning — the spark of a future where their flag flies higher and louder on the world's tennis courts.

### **Embracing Filipino Heritage**

Throughout her rise in tennis, Fernandez has always embraced her Filipino roots, proudly representing the Filipino-Canadian community on the world stage.



Maine Mendoza said she did not expect her recent admission about falling in love with Alden Richards at the height of their AlDub pairing a decade ago would generate buzz.

The "Eat Bulaga" host and actress shared her honest thoughts on X, formerly Twitter, today about the criticism and negativity toward her and Alden after she bared her feelings in the "Tamang Panahon" podcast uploaded on the show's YouTube channel.

"From the start, I hoped the clashes between fans on both sides would end, at least, even though the hate train aimed at me was non-stop then and apparently still remains so," Maine wrote.

As the podcast's name suggested, the show aims to look back at everything that happened on "Kalyeserye," the popular segment of the noon time show where she and Alden become the phenomenal love team "AlDub."

She and her remaining "Eat Bulaga" hosts, Jose Manalo, Wally Bayola, Paolo Bediones and Allan K, discuss anything related to the show — personal experiences, narrativess and sentiments.

"I believe it's acceptable to reflect and openly discuss them for this podcast, especially now that it's been a decade and all is well between the individuals involved, particularly me and Alden," she said.

Alden has stopped appearing on the noon time show after it transferred to its new home, TV5, in 2023. Alden is a talent of Sparkle, the talent agency of GMA-7, where the noontime show was aired for a long time.

Maine said that despite Alden being no longer a part of the show, she sees no reason to exclude him in the podcast since Alden is a vital part of the Kalyeserye. He played the fictionalized version of himself who meets and falls



out," Maine said.

At the podcast, Maine revealed that she had confessed her feelings to Alden. She said that she had always been vocal about it, and if anybody had asked, she would have affirmed it.

Maine said that she just wanted to know if he returned the feelings, but Alden never replied to her. He never courted her. In 2023, Alden shared with Boy Abunda that he "confessed" and also fell in love with Maine.

Ten years on, we are all living the lives we chose, and I hope we can keep moving forward without nurturing hate-because what's the point? What do we gain from hostility? Again, in the grand scheme of things, what truly needs proving? Find your own answer. Let's live for what makes us happy and make life less complicated and chaotic." she said.

Maine ended by reminding people that life is short to "spew negativity online."

"Don't let it be your only contribution in this life. Ang dami pang pwedeng gawin sa buhay bukod sa pagiging tambay sa internet at pagiging hater. There's another world of better things to do. Leave a better trace," she ended.

"She's actually currently working with Baby Ruth (Villarama)," he said.


"[It's] for a documentary about Pilita Corales. She's producing that. I am so excited for her, especially Baby Ruth, she's really a good doc-

Chan, 80, is known as "The Father of Philippine Christmas Music" following the release of his blockbuster album, "Christmas In Our Hearts," in 1990. He recalled the origins of "Christmas In Our Hearts."

"The melody itself was composed in 1988 to a poem by my friend Chari Cruz Zarate, "Ang Tubig Ay Buhay," which she used as a high school jubilee song," said Chan.

Chan continued, "So I wrote the melody, and I never thought that two years later, I

would use that melody for a Christmas song. Universal Records approached me and said it's time we make a Christmas album, given the success of "Please Be Careful With My Heart," "Beautiful Girl," and others.

"So I thought of that melody, and I got a friend of mine, Rina Caniza, to come to the house, and I gave her the melody. Together, we worked on the lyrics.

"At that time, Lea Salonga was a hit because of Miss Saigon. So I approached her and asked if she could do a duet with me. Sabi niya, 'Yes, I'll be glad, too!' She heard the song and liked the melody, except that her recording company would not allow her to record for a

competing label.
"So my next choice was Monique Wilson, an understudy of Miss Saigon. I like her. She's a nice person with a beautiful voice. Unfortunately, she went to Tagaytay and lost her voice. She called me.

"I think the Holy Spirit was leading

me towards my daughter, Liza. Since Universal Records was rushing, 'Joe, it's October, we need to come up with an album!' I went to my daughter's bedroom and said, 'What are you doing?' She said, 'I was cramming for my exams.' I said, 'Can you learn the song quickly? I want to record this with you. Okay. When? This Wednesday. To make a long story short, she and I went to the recording studio, and the rest is history."

All I Want for Christmas (Is

In September 2024, Carey joined Filipino fans in welcoming the holiday

Carey shared a link to her hit song and encouraged her Filipino fans to start playing the Christmas song at the beginning of the "ber" months.

Filipinos start to celebrate the holidays in the Philippines as early as September.

"Philippines, it's time (only for you!!)," Mariah wrote. "I hope you're all safe and well. Let's celebrate together."

In 2023, Mariah reposted a tweet from a fan page indicating that her song "All I Want for Christmas Is You" was streamed 75 percent more in the Philippines than in any other country.

On Dec. 30, 2024, Billboard reported that Carey's "All I Want for Christmas Is You" topped the Billboard Hot 100 for an 18th total week.

"The carol, which leads for a fourth consecutive week this holiday season, moves to within one week of the longest domination in the chart's 66-year history, after only the 19-week rules of Shaboozey's "A Bar Song (Tipsy)" this year and Lil Nas X's "Old Town Road," featuring Billy Ray Cyrus, in 2019.

"All I Want for Christmas Is You" was initially released on Carey's album Merry Christmas in November 1994 and, as streaming has grown. Holiday music has become more prominent on streaming services' playlists; it hit the Hot 100's top 10 for the first time in December 2017 and the top five for the first time in the 2018 holiday segson

"It led at last, before the past four weeks, over the holidays in 2019 (for three weeks), 2020 (two), 2021 (three), 2022 (four), and 2023 (two)."

### Jeric Raval scores first acting win, considers wife his real award

Veteran action star Jeric Raval was still overwhelmed the day after he received his Best Supporting Actor statuette from the 73rd FAMAS (Filipino Academy of Movie Arts and Sciences) Awards for "Mamay: A Journey to Greatness."

"Salamat, naka-tsamba (Thanks, that was great luck)," said Jeric. "I believed there were other actors more deserving than me," he added. "But I'm really so thankful to the FAMAS for recognizing what I did. Imagine, after 35 years, it is only now that I received an acting award."

"I was not used to receiving an acting award," Jeric said. "I didn't even think I would be nominated. I was so happy that they noticed my acting in 'Mamay."

Jeric bested Ruru Madrid for "Green Bones," Joel Torre for "Under a Piaya Moon," Sid Lucero for "Topakk," Jhong Hilario for "And the Breadwinner Is" and Will Ashley for "Balota."

Even after his rumored 18 children sired with different women, Jeric refused to talk about his love life. He has still been with the same woman (Holiday) since 1990.

"At my age, love life pa?" he smilingly insisted. "I'm still married to the same woman. She is really a good partner. She understood all the troubles I got into. All the headaches."

Jeric is still careful in accepting projects up to this day. "If I play a hitman, I will just kill, but I will not rape a woman. Even (in) my movies before, I never agreed to a rape scene. and exported to the US. He noted the higher tariffs would pose problems for the US supply chain, particularly for its defense industry.

Meanwhile, the Philippines has not formally granted zero tariffs on US products, as negotiations over a reciprocal trade agreement remain ongoing, he said.

Senator Maria Imelda "Imee" R. Marcos said that any trade deal with the US should undergo a Senate review, citing concerns it could be lopsided and pose risks to domestic industries.

"[Based on] the scant information that we have been provided, it's clearly more onerous upon the Philippines and extremely beneficial to the US," she said. "There is even more reason that this agreement should be submitted for the concurrence of the Senate."

Mr. Trump said in July that the Philippines is "going to open market with the United States, and zero tariffs," following his meeting with President Ferdinand R. Marcos, Jr. in Washington.

Also, Department of Economy, Planning, and Development Undersecretary Rosemarie G. Edillon said the effects of US tariffs on Philippine exports could lead to modest medium-term gains through trade diversion.

"If we manage the transition well, then we think that... in the medium term, it could have positive effects by virtue of trade diversion," she said. "It's minus 0.013% from the baseline, and this is equivalent to \$70 million in the short term."

The impact of the US tariff was partly mitigated as the Philippines is not a major exporter, she said.

Meanwhile, US tariffs could help ease inflationary pressures in the country, as trade disruptions slow global economic activity and dampen demand, Bangko Sentral ng Pilipinas Deputy Governor Zeno Ronald R. Abenoja said.

"In the near term, because of the moderation of economic activity both globally and possibly the domestic economy, this could lessen pressures on the inflation rate right now," he said. "We are seeing inflation rate below 2% on average for 2025."

### Canada, US resumes talks

Trump has used the tariffs and threats of even steeper levies to strike new trade deals with the European Union, Japan, Britain and other countries.

The tariffs on Canada, which do not cover goods traded under the Canada-United States-Mexico Agreement on free trade, were raised to 35 per cent on Aug. 1. The White House at the time cited Canada's reciprocal tariffs — which are now set to be removed starting Sept. 1 — and what it called a lack of cooperation on fighting fentanyl trafficking as reasons for the increase.

Canada has stepped up border security resources and law enforcement operations against domestic fentanyl labs since Trump first threatened his tariffs after his election win in November. Fentanyl seized at the Canada-U.S. border by American authorities accounts for less



than one per cent of all fentanyl encountered at U.S. borders, according to U.S. data.

The sometimes-stalled negotiations on a new trade and security agreement between Canada and the U.S. resumed last month.

In a dissenting opinion, four of the appeals court judges noted Trump's tariffs on Canada, Mexico and China have been used as a "bargaining chip" to secure more cooperation on fighting fentanyl trafficking, and have been adjusted accordingly, arguing the IEEPA allows a president to take whatever measures are necessary to deal with an emergency.

The dissent cited the use of IEEPA during the Iran hostage crisis in 1979, which was upheld by the U.S. Supreme Court, though the law's usage at that time only froze Iranian assets and did not impose tariffs on

Iranian goods.

The Trump administration had argued that courts approved former president Richard Nixon's emergency use of tariffs during a 1971 economic crisis under a 1917 law that IEEPA later replaced. The courts have so far rejected that argument, saying it did not apply to this case.

U.S. trade court 'brazenly abused' judicial powers to block Trump tariffs, WH says

If the tariffs are ultimately struck down, the government might have to refund some of the import taxes that it's collected, delivering a financial blow to the U.S. Treasury.

"If these Tariffs ever went away, it would be a total disaster for the Country," Trump wrote on Truth Social on Friday. He has previously warned of another "GREAT DEPRESSION."

Revenue from tariffs totaled a record US\$142 billion by July, more than double what it was at the same point the year before.

The U.S. Justice Department warned in a legal filing this month that revoking the tariffs could mean "financial ruin" for the United States.

# Toronto fans are losing the love as TIFF tries to please badly-needed sponsors

the first time in 2015, she realized she could walk up to almost any part of the red carpet and if she spent a few hours waiting — finagle a selfie with the likes of Eddie Redmayne or Kevin Bacon.

Lately, that feat has become increasingly difficult. Each year, Leung notices more of the onceopen space surrounding the annual film festival's red carpets is taken up by fan zones and corporate watch areas that are competitive to access or require you to be a customer of sponsor brands.

"It's a lot of obstacles and variables nowadays compared to where it used to be," said Leung, who commutes daily during the festival to the red carpets from Markham, Ont., in hopes of snagging snaps with the stars.

Leung's observations come as TIFF, long considered the people's festival because screenings are open to the public, is preparing to host its 50th edition next week. This year's festival will see the world premieres of buzzy films like Guillermo del Toro's rendition of Frankenstein and the third instalment of the Knives Out series, and welcome stars as prolific as Ryan Reynolds and Dwayne (The Rock) John-

But as regulars know, getting the chance to meet them will take more perseverance and patience. That's because the free-



for-all nature that used to exist around the carpet perimeters has been diluted by TIFF's constantly changing policies and its need to appease sponsors.

"Every year it changes, and every year it's a cluster," said Serena Tung, a Toronto woman who

has met stars from Daniel Craig to Jennifer Lopez at TIFF red carpets over the last 20 years. Asked about the

erosion of free carpet spaces fans have observed, TIFF said it is "committed to creating unique, memorable portunities for audiences to engage filmmakers, stars, and fellow film lovers."

"Each year, we work to enhance the experience, particularly at our flag-

Hall," vice-president of strategy, communications and stakeholder relations Judy Lung said.

The hall is TIFF's glitziest venue, which is reserved for the biggest premieres.

> Almost all of the space stretching from the spot where stars are dropped off in blacked out SUVs to where they enter the hall used to be open to fans to gather as they please. Now, much of the area is covered by corporate booths.

> One of the biggest belongs to Rogers, TIFF's presenting sponsor for a second year in a row. Rogers spokesperson Charmaine Khan said the booth is meant to deliver a

"premier entertainment" experience. It has a multi-level viewing space open to Rogers customers but a rush line for the public to join, if space permits.

Last year, Tung said she had to show the company that she was a wireless customer to get access to the booth and then scout a good spot among other entrants.

A similar space from Royal Bank of Canada invites its customers to sign up weeks in advance for free access to no more than two carpets. (Non-customers are able to secure spots later in the process.)

Those who get a slot in the two-level booth are told the experience is "first-come, first served." The prized lower-level ship red carpet at Roy Thomson spaces, where you're more likely to get your celeb selfies, are prioritized for Avion Rewards Elite members.

> "Last year, my friend and I went early, about one-and-a-half hours before they started letting people in. We were probably in the first 10 people and we had to go upstairs," Leung said. "We couldn't sit downstairs next to the carpet area, which was kind of frustrating after waiting so

> RBC chief brand officer Shannon Cole did not answer questions about the erosion of easily accessible space along the carpet because of booths like her company's but said in an email that the setup allows the bank "to not only give ... access to interact

with stars walking the red carpet, but to build an elevated hospitality experience for them while doing so."

Guests at the booth get swag bags and opportunities to win prizes, the bank said.

Farther down the carpet is often a final booth run by alcohol brand Peroni. In past years, it's let anyone queue outside and space permitting — grants free entry and a drink.

While it might take more work to get into one of the corporate booths, their emergence helps keep the festival going, said Paul Moore, a sociology professor at Toronto Metropolitan University who studies the history of moviegoing.

"Anyone who's nostalgically complaining about TIFF not being like the old days also needs to recognize, for better or for worse, that the financial situation is not like the olden days either," he said.

### **Challenges for TIFF in recent years**

In the last few years, the festival has dealt with the COVID-19 pandemic and two Hollywood strikes, which limited the number of screenings it could host and stars that visited. TIFF also lost support from major sponsor Bell and faced the arts sector's usual struggles with funding.

These factors have made finding the right balance between satisfying sponsors and fans even

Jollibee has 28 stores in Canada--12 in Ontario, 8 in Alberta, and more in Manitoba, Saskatchewan, and British Columbia.

Its burger brand Smashburger also has 6 Canadian stores.

The Jollibee Group has wholly owned brands including ChowKing, Greenwich, Red Ribbon, Mang Inasal, Yonghe King and Hong Zhuang Yuan, and fran-



chised brands including Burger King, Panda Express, and Yoshinoya in the Philippines.

JFC has been expanding its portfolio of brands worldwide with recent acquisitions such as Korea's Compose Coffee and Taiwan's Milksha. It also struck deals to bring Common Man Coffee Roasters and Tiong Bahru Bakery to the Philippines.

Recently, it took over the management and ownership of the Michelin-starred Tim Ho Wan restaurant chain.

Jollibee had earlier said it plans to open some 700 to 800 new stores globally this year, across brands and markets.

more difficult.

One of the ways TIFF has tried to satisfy festival goers is with fan zones at Roy Thomson Hall, Princess of Wales Theatre and the Royal Alexandra Theatre. The barricaded areas in central spots along the routes stars take into theatres were introduced in recent years, turning the red carpet from an almost completely open space to one with mostly designated areas fans must put in more effort to enter.

TIFF originally handed out free wristbands every morning that gave access to the zones, prompting long lines when teen heartthrobs and It Girls were due to make appearances.

"When people camp out there morning to night and they're at the barricade, you never get up close," Leung said. "You'd have to find another spot or hope somebody leaves."

This year, TIFF has fans jockeying for entry via Ticketmaster, where it will release free passes at noon each day. Fans can sign up for one pass per screening and if they don't snag entry online, can wait in a rush line in hopes that someone who landed admission doesn't show up.

Leung likes that the online model cuts down on fans having to be early risers or miss work or school to secure a fan zone spot but Tung is wary of the system crashing if demand surges or bots or resellers vie for spaces.

If they get passes, that's just one hurdle cleared. Tung estimates some zones can hold 200 people who will all want to be as close to the action as possible.

"For me taking selfies, I want to be on the front row, so I would line up one hour, maybe two hours ahead of time to ensure I get a good spot," she said.

But at least the zones remain free.

"They don't necessarily need to do that," Moore said. "Everything down in that zone could be for festival goers and ticketed customers."

Given all the hurdles, Leung and Tung have sometimes been trying their luck elsewhere; outside restaurants and hotels, where stars are partying, doing press conferences and visiting gifting lounges.

"You've got to kind of leverage those spots more because it's not like you can rely on the red carpets anymore," Leung said.


With her success at the DC

upbringing to infuse authenticity and nuance into her

characters.

Vlassopoulos, an only child, that she said came up with the two main characters sisterspartly because she was interested in sibling relationships.

"I wanted to explore the relationship between two sisters who are very close in

age, but also different."

The book's theme about the struggles of infertility was an experience Vlassopoulos had gone through herself.

"I have one daughter who's now 10 years old and it had been an experience that I've gone through at the time. I found that (infertility) wasn't represented in a lot of a lot of pop culture—not in books or in movies."

Another theme she wanted to explore was her biracial upbringing.

"I definitely wanted the characters to be at least partially Filipino," she shared in an interview. "It's my identity as someone who's half Filipino."

"And again, like infertility, it's not always something that you see represented in books."

The Filipino influence emerges vividly in her writing through relatable scenes centred around karaoke and Filipino cuisine—two beloved staples of

Filipino gatherings.

"There is one karaoke scene in the book that I couldn't resist not talking

> about," said, laughing.

"I love karaoke. I feel like it's one of my most Filipino traits."

Another distinct element reflecting her heritage food, a central motif in the novel. The main character is a food blog-

"Food is so

important," Vlassopoulos emphasizes, underscoring how this element reflects broader themes of identity and belong-

Yet, the Filipino experience in her work isn't limited to joyful communal moments. The book delves into deeper cultural undertones such as superstition and faith, intricately woven through the Filipino mother's character.

"Sometimes I wonder when I consider things Filipino—is it just my mom, or is it the culture?" Vlassopoulos mus-

"Filipinos, as well as infertility, aren't

"I've been so touched by how it's been received (in the Filipino community)."

Ultimately, for Vlassopoulos, "Living Expenses" is about more than just storytelling—it's about hope, representation, and the joy of seeing one's heritage celebrated openly and proudly.

"I really wanted to write a book that leaves you feeling hopeful," she concluded, capturing the heart of what makes her novel so beautifully human and genuinely


"Saka iba po 'yung pag-prep sa food. Kumbaga, iba talaga 'yung ditong gawang Pinas," she added.



Fourteen years after she first walked into an ABS-CBN dressing room as a child on the gag show "Goin' Bulilit," Belle Mariano found herself in the same spot last week — this time no longer a wide-eyed little girl but a young woman who has become one of her genbrightest eration's stars.

The occasion was the "Forever Kapamilya: Born to Shine" contract signing, where Belle renewed her ties with ABS-CBN and Star Magic.

"I'm thrilled, of course," she said of the moment. "This is really something that I've been looking forward to, and I feel like this just solidifies that I'm a Kapamilya forever."

For Belle, the ceremony wasn't just about the ink on the page. As she shared in a media conference afterward, it stirred memories of her earliest years in the industry.

# BINI files legal complaint over altered Filipino food review video



P-pop group BINI files cybercrime case against an unnamed individual over an edited food review video that threw online hate at the Hall of Justice in Laguna on August 18, 2025.

P-pop girl group BINI filed a cybercrime case in conjunction with unjust vexation earlier today, August 18, after their Filipino food review was spliced and generated negative reactions, including "personal attacks and grave insults."

Film producer and celebrity lawyer Joji Alonso accompanied the eight members of the group to the Hall of Justice in Sta. Rosa, Laguna, to file the complaint.

Alonso said the case against the unnamed individual falls under cybercrime, under Sections 4B and 6 of Republic Act 10175 or the Cybercrime Prevention Act of 2012, in conjunction with unjust vexation under Article 287 of the Revised Penal Code.

"This emanated from the splicing of a 25-minute video of the BINI members, trying and rating Filipino street food. The uploaded spliced version was cut to 2 minutes and only showed only their negative reactions, completely changing the show's narrative," Alonso said.

The edited video fueled "online hate and bashing" against BINI. Alonso said that it "escalated to personal attacks, name-calling, and grave insults."

The lawyer added that the video painted the girls in a bad light that caused "irreparable emotional and mental distress."

"It must be remembered that freedom to post online is not an absolute right, and must be accompanied by truth, accountability and responsibility. Right to free speech ends when it starts to malign reputations or cause harm and damage upon others," Alonso said.

Alonso's post came with the photos of all eight members of BINI: Jhoanna, Colet, Maloi, Stacey, Gwen, Aiah, Sheena, and Mikha.

The lawyer ended her post by saying that the P-pop group is taking a "strong stance" against the "prevalent" digital form of abuse.

this case, BINI stands as a voice in fighting for all those who remain unheard," the counsel added.

Here's my chat with Mart:

Among all your songs in Take 2, which one hits you in an entirely different way this time

"Of the nine OPM classics I recorded in this Take 2 album, there is one song I used to love to listen to back in the '80s. It's a song written and recorded by Iwi Laurel entitled, Special Memory, and even though I was still very new in the business, I would feel so sentimental and miss my life as a young boy dreaming to become a singer during my childhood.

"Why does it hit me differently now that I have done a 'take 2' version of it? Well, for the simple reason that now that I have been living my dream for the last 43 plus years, I find myself feeling a little like a special memory myself. Time can do that to you.

"With all these great singers and songwriters and hitmakers emerging today, I ask myself: Have I done enough? Did I give enough to an industry that has been so very good to me? Will I be remembered for the good I have done or for the viral bad?"

Since Take 2 won't be available on streaming platforms, do you prefer vinyl albums? "Actually, to be honest with you, I am still very new with the whole streaming thing. I thought streaming was a new kind of fishing sport. Although my very first contribution to OPM was on a long-playing vinyl album entitled Take 1, so this concept is comfortable for me. But I look forward to an all-original OPM album to be streamed on all platforms the way we are all used to doing today on the next project."

If you could do a Take 2 of any moment in your life and change how you handled it, what would it be?

"The list of 'Take 2s' I could have for my failed 'Take 1s' in life would be endless — some bigger and more life-changing than others. If given the chance to turn a failure into a victory, I'd be a fool not to take it.

"There are some things in life you should not Take 2 on. Maybe God wanted us to learn from that life lesson to become the people we are today. So live and learn and make sure you don't have to think about another Take 2 in your life again."

What's your advice to young artists who are more driven by views and likes when creating music?

"You don't need to be viewed or liked to be creative enough to make a difference in this world and, more importantly, in this industry. Create and make music that will change lives. Not to make yourself popular or rich, but to inspire a nation of frustrated dreamers and overthinkers. You have the power in your hands.

but use your heart too.

"I care very much about OPM and the entire entertainment industry and where it goes from here. So much so that I make sure the new and the young and up-and-coming hear from me as I try and make them believe that I believe in all they stand for. Yesterday, today and

omorrow."

Are you willing to do a Take 2 and try marriage again or once is enough?

"Wow, somehow I knew you would ask that question. My doors are never closed. If she will have me, why not? But I am a true believer that we don't need a ring or a contract to know where we are going or how

much we can or should love each other.

In a now-expired Instagram Story, Richards shared a screen capture of Sarah and Curlee Discaya sharing a glimpse of their luxury vehicles in an interview with Julius Babao.

"Gising na, sobra na (It's time to wake up. This is too much)," Richards said.

The Discayas came under fire after several of their construction companies were linked to the anomalous multibillion-peso contracts with the Department of Public Works and Highways (DPWH) to oversee its flood control projects.

Sarah Discaya, who ran for Pasig as mayor but lost to incumbent Vico Sotto, appeared at the Senate investigation on Monday.

### Accountability

Meanwhile, on her Instagram Story, Jodi Sta. Maria reminded her followers to hold the government accountable, especially when it comes to demanding where one's taxes go.

"We work hard, give what we can, and pay our taxes trusting they serve the greater good. But when they uplift only a few, it makes me think — true change rests only in our choices, but also in holding accountable those who deliberately break public trust," she said, while sharing photos of roads submerged in the flood.

On the other hand, Mika Salamanca reposted an IN-QUIRER.net report of Quezon City being submerged in flood waters on her X (formerly Twitter) page saying, "walang pipikit (keep your eyes open)."

In a separate post, Salamanca hoped that the public's fury on the ongoing controversy will remain until the 2028 elections.

(I know we're living in dark times. But this is not the time to be blind with what's happening. Let's keep our eyes open until 2028. Can we do it?)

Meanwhile, G22's AJ and Alfea didn't hold back from voicing out their fury regarding the nation still battered in floodwaters on their respective X pages.

"Nakikita niyo ba ang sitwasyon?! Kaya bakit dapat hayaan at palipasin nalang (Do you see the situation right now? We shouldn't allow this to happen and to simply slip by)???? Don't let this die down. Someone should be held accountable," AJ said while resharing a clip from INQUIRER.net.

AJ added in a separate post that the recent senate hearing made her upset, saying, "Tumataas dugo ko sa senate hearing (that senate hearing made my blood boil)."

On the other hand, Alfea demanded accountability on her X account while reiterating that the country is already battered by floodwaters even if the rain is not as strong yet.

Aside from Geronimo and Guidicelli, other celebrities who used their


